The Liturgy of the Word The First Reading

1 Corinthians 12:12-31a

A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians.

Just as the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body - Jews or Greeks, slaves or free - and we were all made to drink of one Spirit. Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. If the foot were to say, 'Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body', that would not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear were to say, 'Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body', that would not make it any less a part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one

of them, as he chose. If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is, there are many members, yet one body. The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I have no need of you', nor again the head to the feet, 'I have no need of you.' On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and those members of the body that we think less honourable we clothe with greater honour, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honour to the inferior member, that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honoured, all rejoice together with it. Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers; then deeds of power, then gifts of healing, forms of assistance, forms of leadership, various kinds of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret? But strive for the greater gifts.

This is the word of the Lord.




Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.



Organ Maintenance: From 6 January – 21 February essential maintenance work will be taking place on Exeter Cathedral's Grand Organ. The work will involve a complete renewal of the organ's reservoirs and trunking which provide wind to the instrument. Our service schedule will continue as normal and will be accompanied by piano and chamber organ.

Well-Tempered Clavier for Cathedral Choir Tour

While the main organ is out of action for two months at the beginning of this year, our Organ Scholar, Adam Field, will be playing the complete Well-Tempered Clavier by J. S. Bach as voluntaries before and after choral services. This will be in aid of the Cathedral Choir tour to Normandy and Paris in July this year.
