From the Company of Tapisers:

Throughout my life I have been privileged to know some very special people: those who 'stand out in a crowd' for the joy and kindness they emanate towards others. Olive Eyles was one of these remarkable people.

Olive, who died recently at the grand age of 101, regularly attended services and was a valued member of The Company of Tapisers for many years. She enthusiastically worked on the Rondel cushions in the 1980s; then moved on to create the angel-wings design for the cushions and kneelers for St Gabriel's Chapel (see photo below) in memory of her beloved daughter; she stitched a section of the Quire cushions, as well as many smaller cushions. All these projects required careful attention to detail, accurate needlework skills and an appreciation of colour and design – and Olive excelled in all areas.



She continued as an active Tapiser well into her 80s and onlv stopped sewing when her eyesight began to fail. However, until 2020 she still came to our meetings to encourage share and her knowledge with us while chatting over a cup of coffee.

I first met Olive when she was a youthful 86 year old! She was

incredibly positive and practical and lived independently until after her 100th birthday! Her interests extended to all aspects of life: her family and friends, The News, the latest cricket scores, the natural world, crafts, the arts and Exeter Cathedral. She was blessed with an astonishing memory – she never forgot anything! Resilient, generous, gracious, kind and joyful, her love for others was genuine and warm – and she was greatly loved in return.

Cathedral Lecture 18th March 2025: Professor Grace Davie Religion in modern Europe: Some unexpected challenges

The starting point of this lecture can be found in the work of Tomáš Halik, and in particular his most recent book *The Afternoon of Christianity: The Courage to Change*. Halik – a Czech Catholic priest trained in both theology and sociology – emphasizes the importance of context in understanding the place of religion in modern societies. Context is considered in terms of time as well as space and is constantly changing.

The second section draws briefly on an article that I published in 2006 which focused on the factors to take into account in understanding the religious situation in Europe at the turn of the millennium.

The third section indicates the changes that have taken place since then and the reasons for these. Some changes were expected; others less so, notably the growth of populism right across Europe and the place of religion in this. The mood is darker. The key to understanding these shifts is to *hold together* two much-studied phenomena: continuing – indeed remorseless – secularization and growing religious diversity. The implications are considerable.

Grace Davie is well known to many in the Cathedral Community, and she has lectured and led awaydays here on several occasions. She is Professor Emeritus in the University of Exeter. Her main area of research is the sociology of religion on which she has published widely. She is a Lay Canon in the Diocese of Europe and has held posts in many universities in Europe and beyond.


Thank you to Anne Foreman




Following on from his successful course on the Gospel of Mark, last year, Richard will now lead a new seven-week course on **the Gospel of John**, which has been described as "a book in which a child can paddle, but an elephant can swim deep" — often given to new or young Christians, yet which has kept theologians and mystics studying and debating for generations.

The Revd Canon Professor **Richard A. Burridge** is an internationally

recognised biblical scholar, ethicist, theologian and social commentator. He was Dean of King's College London from 1993 to 2019. Now a Research Fellow in the Department of Theology at the University of Manchester, and a Visiting Professor at Virginia Theological Seminary, USA, he devotes his time to research and writing, as well as his public ministry lecturing and undertaking theological training for clergy and lay people. In addition to his academic work, his best-selling Four Gospels, One Jesus? has made biblical scholarship accessible to a wider audience, while his Commentary on John's Gospel was adopted by Archbishop Rowan Williams as "one of the finest and most accessible of modern studies", being given to all Anglican bishops who attended the Lambeth Conference 2008. His academic scholarship on Jesus and the gospels, and his contribution to the life of the world-wide church, was recognised when he was awarded the 2013 Ratzinger Prize by Pope Francis, the first non-Roman Catholic to receive this prestigious prize.

A New Publication John Allan: Archaeological Studies at Exeter Cathedral

The cloisters of Exeter Cathedral, designed by two major figures in the story of medieval architecture in England – Thomas of Witney and Robert Lesyngham – must once have been one of the key 14th-century buildings in the West Country. They were demolished in the Civil War, and their site in now occupied by various later structures, themselves of considerable architectural interest.

When in the late 1990s the Cathedral Chapter considered rebuilding part of the lost cloister, it was apparent that a much fuller understanding of the site's architectural history would be needed to inform the programme.

This led to a series of investigations of its standing buildings, accompanied by new documentary research and selective archaeological investigation below ground, where a sequence of Roman deposits and unexpected burials of the 7th/8th centuries AD were encountered. This volume brings together the results of archaeological work conducted on the site over the last 25 years.

Music Notes

Sabbatical Leave

Timothy Noon is now on sabbatical leave until early March. Michael Stephens-Jones will be the acting director of music in Tim's absence, assisted by Adam Field, our organ scholar. Our very best wishes to Tim for a restful and productive time away, and to Michael and Adam for their time at the helm.

The Cathedral Organ

The organ will be out of action until 21st February while essential maintenance work is done. The work will involve a complete renewal of the organ's reservoirs and trunking which provide wind to the instrument. Our service schedule will continue as normal and will be accompanied by our grand piano and chamber organ.

Adam Field's Fundraising Feast of Bach

Adam writes, While the Grand Organ of Exeter Cathedral is out of action from January to February this year for some much-needed TLC, I have taken the opportunity to perform the complete Well-Tempered Clavier (BWV 846-963) by J. S. Bach. This is a collection of preludes and fugues in every key (on each of the 12 notes), major and minor, twice - thus, 48. I will be playing these as voluntaries before and after choral services in the Cathedral from 9th January to 2nd March, on the grand piano or on the Cathedral's 4-stop Tickell chamber organ of 2007. The last few performances will be on the Grand Organ after its return.

This project will be in aid of the Cathedral Choir's tour to Normandy and Paris in July 2025. If you feel willing and able to support, then please do so here. Otherwise, please do support by coming to any choral service to hear some lovely Bach!

We can look forward to a prelude before, and a fugue after, weekday Evensong (except Friday) and Sunday Eucharist, and a complete prelude and fugue before and after Sunday Evensong. By 2nd March this would tick off 41 of the 48. For the remaining seven, Adam will select some weekday Evensongs for a bonus prelude fugue. He will save some of the larger works for the last week of the schedule when the Cathedral Organ is back in action....and he can use his feet again!

Exeter Cathedral Lent Course 2025 A Rule of Life: A Rule for My Life

A short course commencing with a guided afternoon's retreat on Ash Wednesday (5th March) in The Sacristy followed by three fortnightly meetings between 12.00 and 1.00 on 9th, 23rd of March and the 6th of April in the Richard Eyre Room. During this Lenten journey, we shall be giving time to exploring our relationship with God and giving practical tools on how we deepen our commitment to follow Christ every day of our lives.

Ash Wednesday (5 March): A Guided Meditation on 'A Return to Love" 2.30-4.00 pm

A time of guided contemplation and preparation to equip us for this Lenten journey and to enable those who wish to continue to examine and deepen their discipleship through Lent.

Session 1: Sunday 9th March 12.00 to 1.00: What is a Rule of Life and How Do We Live It?

In this session, we shall introduce the idea and practice of a Rule of Life, taking time to introduce the Cathedral's own Rule of Life and consider how habits can positively shape and nurture a life of faith. We shall take time to explore how rhythm and structure can enable growth even when the fruits of such practices are not immediately apparent or obvious. There will be opportunities for personal and shared reflection and time to consider how individual practices might be cultivated in the coming weeks.


Session 2: Sunday 23rd March 12.00 to 1.00: Session 2: Exploring the Examen

In this session, we shall dive deeper into a particular spiritual practice, the Examen, as a way in which we can pay attention to the moments in each day when we notice ourselves drawing close to or away from God. We shall think about how we might find ways to weave into our lives, times for candid self-examination, as well as reflect on times when we might overlook opportunities for gratitude. We hope that participants will be encouraged to try out the Examen in their everyday lives.

Session 3: Sunday 6th April 12.00 to 1.00: Your Personal Vocation

Here we shall consider our personal calling or vocation and ways to align it with service to others. We shall introduce ways in which we might reconnect with our unique calling and how we might align our lives with God's purposes for the world. In this final session, we shall revisit our personal Rule of Life and think through how we might commit to continuing to live it out during Lent and beyond.
